## 24 Government Promotional Measures: Incentives, Subsidies, and Bounties

### The Economic Rationale Behind State Interventions

Government promotional measures represent deliberate macroeconomic interventions designed to correct structural market failures, lower initial barriers to entry for young ventures, and minimize regional industrial disparities. By providing fiscal and physical buffers, the state reduces the initial risk exposure of private innovators, steering national capital toward high-growth, technology-intensive, or export-oriented industrial manufacturing sectors.

### Core Classifications of State Promotional Support

- **Incentives:** Motivational benefits extended to ventures to induce targeted industrial behaviors. Key structures include *Tax Holidays* (exemption from corporate income taxes for a specified multi-year developmental block), customized import duty exemptions on advanced capital machinery, and accelerated depreciation allowances on specialized factory setups.
- **Subsidies:** Direct or indirect financial support intended to minimize daily operating expenses. Examples include *Power Subsidies* (reimbursing power tariffs for heavy industrial units), *Capital Investment Subsidies* (matching a fixed percentage of the initial asset setup costs), and *Transport Subsidies* (offsetting logistical costs for ventures operating in remote or disadvantaged geographic areas).

- **Bounties:** Direct state premiums or financial rewards paid to producers to stimulate specific outputs or safeguard domestic industries (e.g., export performance bounties aimed at enhancing international trade competitiveness).

## | 25 Policy initiatives related to entrepreneurship including those related to self-help group entrepreneurship

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### National Strategic Policy Frameworks

Government policy frameworks establish the institutional ground rules for venture creation ecosystems. In India, policies like the **National Policy for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship** serve as a master blueprint. This framework focuses on aligning vocational educational curriculums with practical corporate demands, digitizing regulatory compliance workflows, setting up localized incubation ecosystems, and building non-collateral debt guarantee frameworks to unlock hidden grassroots market value.

### Macro Policy Orientations for Self-Help Group (SHG) Development

To scale micro-ventures across rural economies, state policies have shifted from basic welfare support to building active micro-enterprise sustainability frameworks. Key elements include:

#### The SHG Policy Integration Matrix:

- **Priority Sector Lending Mandates:** The Reserve Bank of India strictly requires commercial banks to allocate a fixed percentage of their net lending capacity to micro-enterprises and SHGs, ensuring capital access.
- **Formal Credit Interlinking Models:** Direct financial policies mapping SHG organizational accounts to formal national banking systems, removing predatory local money-lending structures.
- **State Procurement Preferences:** Explicit statutory policies requiring state institutions and local bodies to source uniform items, office materials, or catering lines directly from certified SHG consortiums.

## | 26 Institutional Support: Central and state-level institutional support for business units

### The Institutional Support Architecture in India

Enterprises rely on a multi-tiered network of specialized state and central institutions designed to provide infrastructure, technical guidance, and operational assistance:

Institution Name	Operational Framework and Mandate	Strategic Value Provided
<b>DICs (District Industries Centres)</b>	State-level nodal bodies operating at the district level to act as a single point of contact for small-scale entrepreneurs.	Provides single-window clearances, processes statutory license applications, and coordinates raw material allocations locally.
<b>NSIC (National Small Industries Corporation)</b>	A Central Government enterprise focused on enhancing the competitive strength of MSMEs.	Assists with raw material procurement, facilitates participation in government tenders, and coordinates marketing assistance programs.
<b>SFCs (State Financial Corporations)</b>	State-level development financial institutions established under the SFCs Act 1951.	Provides medium and long-term term debt capital to small and medium industrial units for asset acquisitions.

### Infrastructure Infrastructure Assets: Industrial Estates and SEZs

The state optimizes manufacturing clusters by building specialized geographical zones that consolidate critical infrastructure dependencies:

- **Industrial Estates:** Dedicated tracts of land developed and subdivided into factory sheds by state bodies (e.g., KSIDC or KIADB). They provide pre-installed access to high-capacity power lines,

continuous industrial water supply, waste treatment plants, and integrated logistics hubs, reducing early setup costs.

- **Special Economic Zones (SEZs):** Specially designated, duty-free enclaves treated as foreign territories for tariff purposes under the SEZ Act 2005. Designed to accelerate export volume, attract Foreign Direct Investment (FDI), and build infrastructure. SEZs unlock massive privileges, including 100% Income Tax exemptions under Section 10AA for the initial 5 years, single-window customs clearances, and exemption from central sales taxes on domestic procurement.

## | 27 Programmes and initiatives specifically targeted towards self-help group entrepreneurship

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To transition rural household savings units into active micro-businesses, the state runs targeted enterprise programs:

- **DAY-NRLM (Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana - National Rural Livelihoods Mission):** A massive central program designed to build efficient and effective institutional platforms for the rural poor. It funds regular revolving credit injections and provides specialized capacity-building resources.
- **SVEP (Start-up Village Entrepreneurship Programme):** A targeted sub-component of DAY-NRLM. It builds a local ecosystem to support rural startup creation, providing financial support lines, structured business viability training, and creating a cadre of local consultants known as *Community Resource Persons for Enterprise Promotion (CRP-EP)*.
- **Kudumbashree (Kerala State Poverty Eradication Mission):** One of the world's most successful women-oriented, community-based development programs. Operating through a three-tier structure—Neighborhood Groups (NHGs), Area Development Societies (ADSs), and Community Development Societies (CDSs)—Kudumbashree converts neighborhood micro-savings into active community businesses (e.g., collective farming, IT units, apparel manufacturing, and local cafe chains).

## | 28 MSME Policy: Government's policy towards Small Scale Industries (SSI)

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### The MSMED Act Structural Framework

The Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises Development (MSMED) Act 2006 establishes the statutory framework governing small-scale industries in India. Under modern revisions, enterprises are classified using a composite metric tracking investment in plant and machinery alongside annual turnover parameters.

### Core Support Dimensions of MSME Policy

1. **Entrepreneurial Input & Technical Assistance:** Managed via MSME Development Institutes (MSME-DIs) and specialized Central Tool Rooms, providing cutting-edge product design facilities, testing labs, and high-precision engineering assistance to upgrade quality standards.
2. **Strategic Marketing Assistance:** Facilitated through the *Government e-Marketplace (GeM)* portal—a mandatory digital marketplace where state bodies must source products directly from registered MSMEs, opening up secure corporate revenue pipelines.

### Industrial Sickness: Meaning, Causes, and Diagnostic Realities

An MSME unit is classified as industrially "sick" when its financial position deteriorates significantly, leading to continuous operating losses that erode its net worth capital base, threatening insolvency. Sickness is driven by two interacting variable forces:

- **Internal Causes (Managerial and Operational Errors):** Poor financial planning, misjudged product diversification moves, absolute technical obsolescence due to a failure to upgrade machinery, and internal co-founder friction loops.
- **External Causes (Macro-Environmental Variables):** Acute regional power grid shortages, delayed payments from corporate buyers that disrupt working capital runways, abrupt changes in government fiscal or trade policies, and global raw material scarcity.

### Remedial Assistance and Institutional Training

The state deploys targeted relief vehicles to rehabilitate viable sick units through specialized restructuring guidelines managed by the Reserve Bank of India, alongside debt restructuring frameworks under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC). Furthermore, institutional bodies like

**\*\*NIESBUD\*\*** (National Institute for Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development) and **\*\*EDII\*\*** run continuous Entrepreneurship Development Programmes (EDPs) to build management, compliance, and accounting skills across target groups.

## | 29 Entrepreneurial Climate in India/Kerala: An overview of Initiatives and Programmes

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### The National Entrepreneurial Ecosystem

India's current entrepreneurial climate is supported by major central programs designed to digitize, de-risk, and fund early-stage startups:

- **Startup India Programme:** A landmark national initiative designed to build a strong startup ecosystem. It unlocks critical privileges: 3 years of complete corporate income tax holidays, compliance self-certification models for environmental and labor laws, fast-tracked patent applications with an 80% rebate on filing fees, and access to a ₹10,000 Crore Fund-of-Funds allocation.
- **Stand-Up India Scheme:** A targeted non-collateral credit delivery mandate requiring every commercial bank branch to extend long-term term debt between ₹10 Lakhs and ₹1 Crore to at least one Scheduled Caste (SC) or Scheduled Tribe (ST) borrower, and at least one Woman borrower, for setting up greenfield enterprises.
- **PMMY (Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojana):** Operates as an active micro-credit refinancing channel, providing collateral-free loans divided into *Shishu* (up to ₹50,000), *Kishor* (up to ₹5 Lakhs), and *Tarun* (up to ₹10 Lakhs) brackets to fund non-corporate micro-businesses.
- **Udyamimitra Portal:** A digital portal designed by SIDBI that links entrepreneurs directly to credit institutions, streamline loan application tracking, and matches founders to non-financial support services.

### The Kerala State Entrepreneurial Ecosystem

Kerala features a highly progressive, knowledge-driven entrepreneurial climate managed via advanced state-level support systems:

**Key Kerala State Interventions:**

- **KSUM (Kerala Startup Mission):** The apex nodal agency implementing the state's startup policy. KSUM manages state incubation networks, runs specialized seed fund grant schemes, organizes international investor matching events, and provides patent cost reimbursements.
- **K-SWIFT (Kerala Single Window Interface for Fast Transparent Clearance):** A unified online portal that automates corporate clearings across multiple state departments. It allows founders to secure mandatory licenses and clearances within strict statutory timelines, reducing regulatory friction.
- **Kudumbashree Micro-enterprise Support:** Blends state livelihood funding with rural group dynamics, scaling thousands of neighborhood-level micro-units in agritech, eco-packaging, and commercial retail.
